A local donor in Alwar has offered an amount of money to provide the necessary medical treatment.

JAI HO!

When the film Slumdog Millionaire came out recently it caused quite a stir in India, not least at the Foundation. We have recently opened a school in the slum area of Alwar city, so it felt like there was an immediate connection. Vinod, a 16year old slum dweller says: "We are very happy as the film shows that even the poor can achieve anything." There is a scene in the film which is set in the red light area of Mumbai, when the two boys are searching for their childhood friend, Latika. A few days after seeing the film I was visiting one of the schools in the Alternative Education Project and I was quite moved to realise that most of these happy and lively children will spend their working lives in just such an environment as was portrayed in this scene. Many of the prostitutes working in the big cities in India and the Middle East come from the Nat and Kanjar villages in Rajasthan. The Nirvanavan Foundation is the only organisation which is providing an education in these villages, hopefully offering some of these children alternatives as they grow up.

ADVAITA GARDEN

Purchase of part of the land is now complete. This has involved complex negotiations with the Government, Local Authorities and the local villagers. This is an important step forward in realising the vision of an eco-friendly Children's Village providing a home eventually for up to forty children, housed in five homes of eight children in each. A search is on for an architect to help in designing the whole site so that work can begin slowly with the first home.

The main school here now boasts four new classrooms providing decent accommodation at last for the 140 children enrolled. The cows too have been busy – the eight residents of the gaushala (cowshed) have between them given birth to three new calves over the winter. Quite an experience for the visiting city dweller (me) but a normal occurrence for the children who all have cows, buffaloes or goats at their homes.

Recent donations of books have seen the launch of a library at the school. This project continues with the aim of providing each school with their own library.

U.K.

We are very happy to have been accepted by the Parent/Teacher Association of Wimbledon Park Junior School in London as one of the recipients of their fund-raising activities. Children at the school have been corresponding with the Advaita Garden children for over a year now and the Parent Teacher Association decided earlier this year to include the Foundation as a beneficiary for their fund-raising activities – resulting in a £750 donation from the proceeds of their annual charity walk. NIRVANAVAN WEB SITE

Nick has moved on (we are missing him!) and we are looking for another 'champion' to maintain the site (and also someone to fix our PayPal account, which is not working.)

FUND-RAISING EYES

Occasionally there are articles in the media which give news and information about charitable giving. When I was in London in February I saved four such articles (from the Guardian, the Observer, and the Independent) and between them these gave information about fifteen possible sources of money which we are following up. Please will you act as 'eyes' for the Foundation and let me know of any useful information which you see. Much has been achieved since the Foundation was registered as a Non-Government Organisation in 2001, but much more remains to be done and we need more money. For instance, the teachers in the schools receive a salary of 2,000 rupees a month (less than £30). This compares to a government teacher's salary of about 16,000 rupees. Such a big difference obviously makes it very difficult to find – and to keep – good teachers. Quite simply, they (and the children) deserve more.

Now that we are a charity in the UK we can claim tax credit on all donations, which will increase our income by about a third. Being a Registered Charity also makes us more 'attractive' to possible donors. We are happy to welcome Joanne McDonald as a new Trustee. Joanne spent two weeks at the Foundation in January.

RAHUL

The Rahul Cancer Appeal has raised about a hundred thousand rupees for his cancer treatment. I am happy to say he is responding to treatment very well – he has finished his sessions of radiotherapy and the doctor has decided that he does not need chemotherapy. Any excess money will be used for children in similar circumstances whose families are unable to pay for treatment. Thankyou to everyone who contributed.

The schools which were closed have been re-opened and there are now ten schools again in the Alternative Education Project. One thousand pounds sounds like a lot of money – it IS a lot of money – but when it is divided between all the schools and the other work of the Foundation it doesn't last very long – about a month!

Without you, quite frankly the Foundation would find it much more difficult to flourish. In March the local newspaper headlined an article about my presence in Alwar with the words "The Strings of Love Pulling Across Seven Oceans". Your contributions enable this love to flourish. Thank you.
